Carol Ann Wallace — Rochester



Carol Ann Wallace, 79, of Rochester, died Wednesday, Dec. 12, 2012, at Seasons Hospice in Rochester.

She was born Sept. 6, 1933, in Chicago, Ill., to David and E. Patricia (O'Brien) Wallace. Carol grew up on Bad Medicine Lake in northern Minnesota. She graduated from Detroit Lakes High School. In 1955, Carol graduated from Methodist-Kahler School of Nursing in Rochester, and in 1959 from Mayo Clinic School of Nurse Anesthesia. From 1955-1957, she held several positions at Rochester Methodist Hospital: head nurse, assistant supervisor and supervisor. From 1959 until her retirement in 1987, she was a nurse anesthetist at Mayo Clinic. In 1982 Carol received her bachelor's degree in Individualized Study and then in 1988 her master's degree in Counselor Education: Professional Development, both from Winona State University. She was co-owner of an antique business and owner of Creative Learning Institute and Customized Bus Tours.

Over the years, Carol was involved with the Methodist-Kahler School of Nursing Alumni Association serving on the Board of Directors for 20 years, History Center of Olmsted County, Daughters of the American Revolution, American Association of Nurse Anesthetists, and she served in various capacities on church committees. She was instrumental in organizing the Rochester Chapter of the American Diabetes Association and the Minnesota State Chapter of Myasthenia Gravis. In 1986 Carol established the Carol Ann Wallace Distinguished Lectureship in Human Values at Winona State University.

She enjoyed her cat, Smokie, art, antiques, classical music, reading, history, philosophy, ethics and theology, gardening and studying birds.

There is no immediate family surviving. Carol had many friends and colleagues who will remember her fondly

A Celebration of Life service will be held at 1 p.m., Saturday, Jan. 5, at First Unitarian Universalist Church in Rochester, with David Kraemer officiating. A reception will follow the service. Burial will be in Oakwood Cemetery in Rochester.

Cadet Nurse Corps

This is reprinted from the 1988 February Drawsheet. Showing the summer and winter uniforms of the Cadet Nurse Corps.



On July 1 1941, the Kahler Hospitals School of Nursing (later known as Methodist-Kahler School of Nursing) was approved by the United States Public Health Service to offer its students the opportunity to join the Nurse Corps.

To be eligible, the student had to promise to remain in essential nursing for the duration of World War II and chose which branch of nursing service they wished to follow.

Of the 436 students in the class of 1943, 349 participated in the Cadet Nurse Corps program. By March 1944 the total number of cadets in the Kahler School of Nursing was 407 and three classes a year were starting instead of the usual two. The students in the Cadet Nurse Corps were given tuition, books, uniforms with appropriate insignia and a monthly stipend-\$10.00 a month for the first year. The students completed in 30 months instead of the usual 36, with no loss of practical experience.

The last six months of training presented many interesting possibilities for the students. They could pick one of the five Federal services; Army, Navy, Veterans Administration, U.S. Public Health Services and Indian Bureau. They were also able to request affiliation in another authorized school such as psychiatric nursing at state hospitals; tuberculosis nursing at Glen Lake Sanitarium; rural nursing at Bemidji, Crookston or Grand Rapids Minn.; communicable disease at Ancker Hospital in St. Paul; or general medical or neurological at St. Marys. Several chose work that sent them to these and other cities in Minnesota; St. Albans and Sampson, New York; Topeka, Kan.; Seattle,

Wash.; San Diego and Oakland, Calif.; and Missouri.

Lois Brockmeyer De Joode '47, who told me some of the information elected to go to a Veterans Administration Hospital and was sent to a VA Hospital in Knoxville, Iowa.

"There were 13 of us cadet nurses there to learn about psychiatry. There were over 1000 patients. About half of the patients were young men just home from the war with acute mental illness. The rest were older veterans with a variety of mental illness. The doors were locked with not much yet available for medication, it was a learning experience. Girls did not enter wards alone. The Knoxville VAMC is now closed."

By her senior year, the war was over and the need for nurses was no longer acute. The Nurse Corps had met the needs of the day and made valuable contributions to the nursing profession.

Vieno Hill Culp '44 went to Schick General Hospital, in Clinton, Iowa. Here as well as her nursing duties she met and married Dr. Clyde Culp, who many of you worked with at Methodist Hospital.

Lois Rohl Nicholas '46 worked a year at Washington University in St. Louis, MO. And another year at the Hanford Washington Nuclear Reservation, Richland, WA.

Dorothy Wachholz Howland '45 wrote to inform us of the Women in Military Service for America Memorial, which is at the gateway to Arlington National Cemetery, recognizes the Cadet Nurse Corps women both collectively and individually. The Memorial and its 33,000 sq. ft. education facility tell the story of women's service to the nation, beginning with the American Revolution to the present. Some 250,000 women, including Cadet Nurses, have registered their service with the Memorial. They are listed in a special category, Cadet Nurse Corps Honor Roll. Through an interactive computerized data base, visitors to the Memorial, can access the stories of these women. If you like I have never seen it you can go to a computer and type in www.womensmemorial.org. it is very impressive. So Cadet Nurses and any Kahler or M-K nurse that served register it doesn't cost anything they only suggest a donation. Dorothy did and she and her family went there and were very excited and impressed to see her information. On the back of this page is an application form if you're interested.
